#### COURSE NO.: SS 607N: METHODS OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

M.Phil. 2<sup>nd</sup> Semester; Compulsory Course; Winter Semester: January– May; Credits: 4

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# **Course Description**

The module seeks to introduce students to epistemological assumptions underlying research designs and projects by focusing on the major philosophical and methodological debates in contemporary social sciences. The construction and comprehension of social reality, the question of objectivity, reason and rationality, causal explanations as opposed to interpretations and value judgments would be discussed and debated with reference to the works of some of the major sociologists and philosophers. Partially, the module would also engage with the processes of category formation, the influence of western assumptions and constructs—the processes of objectification of the erstwhile colonised world.

### 1. Scientism, Inductive method and the question of causality and explanation

Focuses on the philosophical and epistemological aspects of positivist social science and its critique. The Vienna Circle and theories of falsification become critical subjects of discussion.

### 2. Interpretive method, understanding and inter-subjectivity

Examines the interpretive social science, the influence of German romanticism, verstehend method and developments in cultural anthropology and ethnography.

# 3. Post-modernism and feminist methodology--debating reason and rationality

This session will focus largely on what are often called post structural or post-modern methods and feminist approaches to social research and their assumptions, standpoints and critiques

# 4. Eurocentrism, Category Formation in the Non-West and the subject of indigeneity

In this section, students would be introduced to the processes of social construction of reality and the politics of knowledge--how the anxieties and assumptions of colonial modernity influenced key methods of sociological enquiry. Does the quest for indigeneity resolve this tension?

### 5. Debates and Practices in Ethnography

This session focuses on the emerging debates and practices in the field of ethnographic inquiry and the modes of representation of the 'cultural other'. The discussion also tracks the questions of subjectivity-objectivity, reflexivity, experience and ethics in the practice of ethnography.

### 6. Questions of Inter-disciplinarity and Social Inquiry.

This session looks at a number of possible new directions the philosophy and methodology of social science might be taking at a critical juncture where disciplines are experiencing radical shifts in their form, content and institutional structures and practices.

### **Course Evaluation**

This course is worth 4 credits - 2 credits for a research project and 2 credits for a combination of book review and presentations. Apart from theend-term submission of a write up for the research project (of not more than 5000 words), there will be two mid-term assignments of 1 credit each; 1. A book review with a focus on the methodological aspects along with a

presentation and submission of a write up (of not more than 2500 words) on specific topics/themes. 2. A term paper to be submitted by deploying a specific method/technique on a topic from the course themes (of not more than 2500 words). Format of presentation, review, deadlines of submission and other modalities will be detailed and finalized during the introductory classes. The students before submitting their paper should give an undertaking that the term paper and project report are not plagiarized.
